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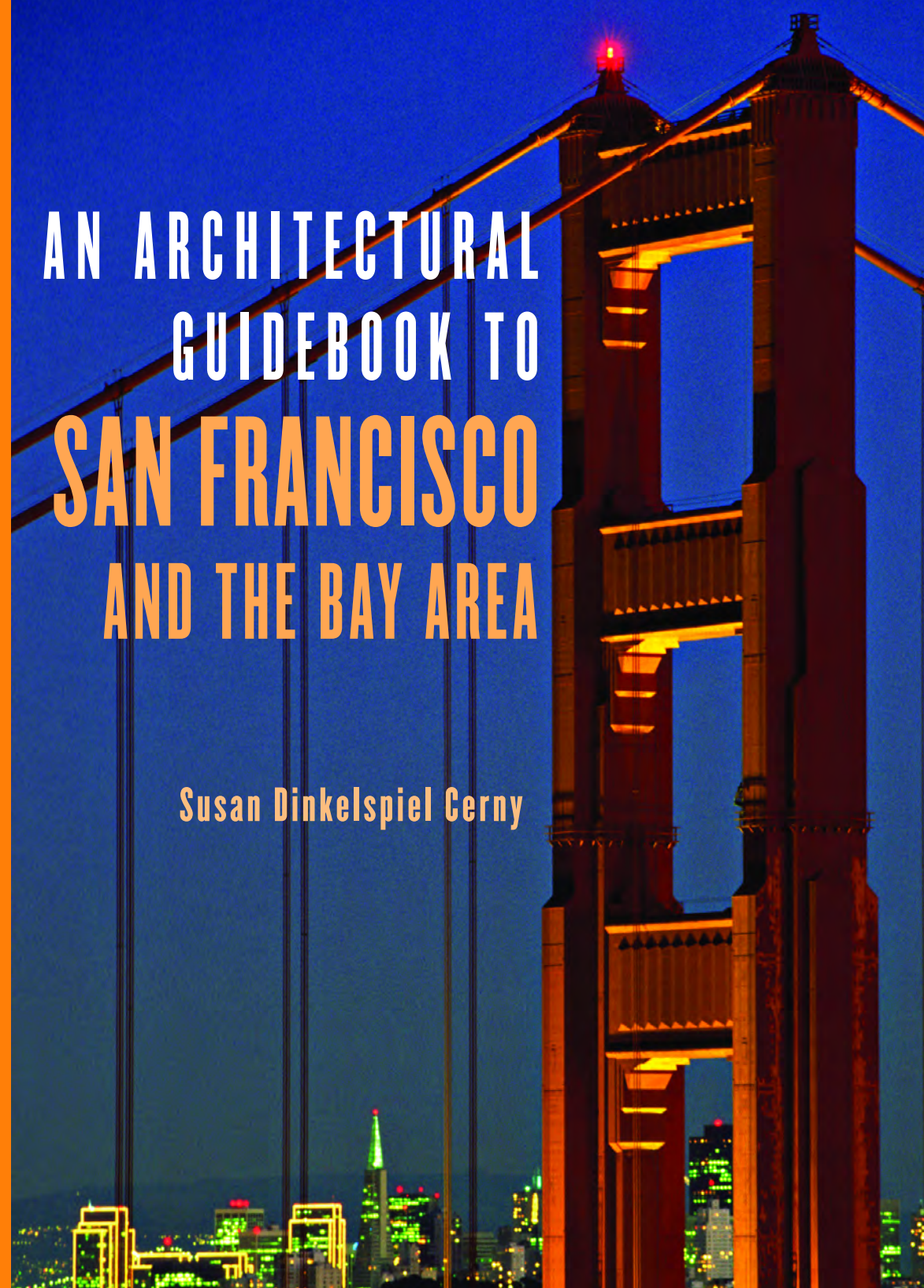
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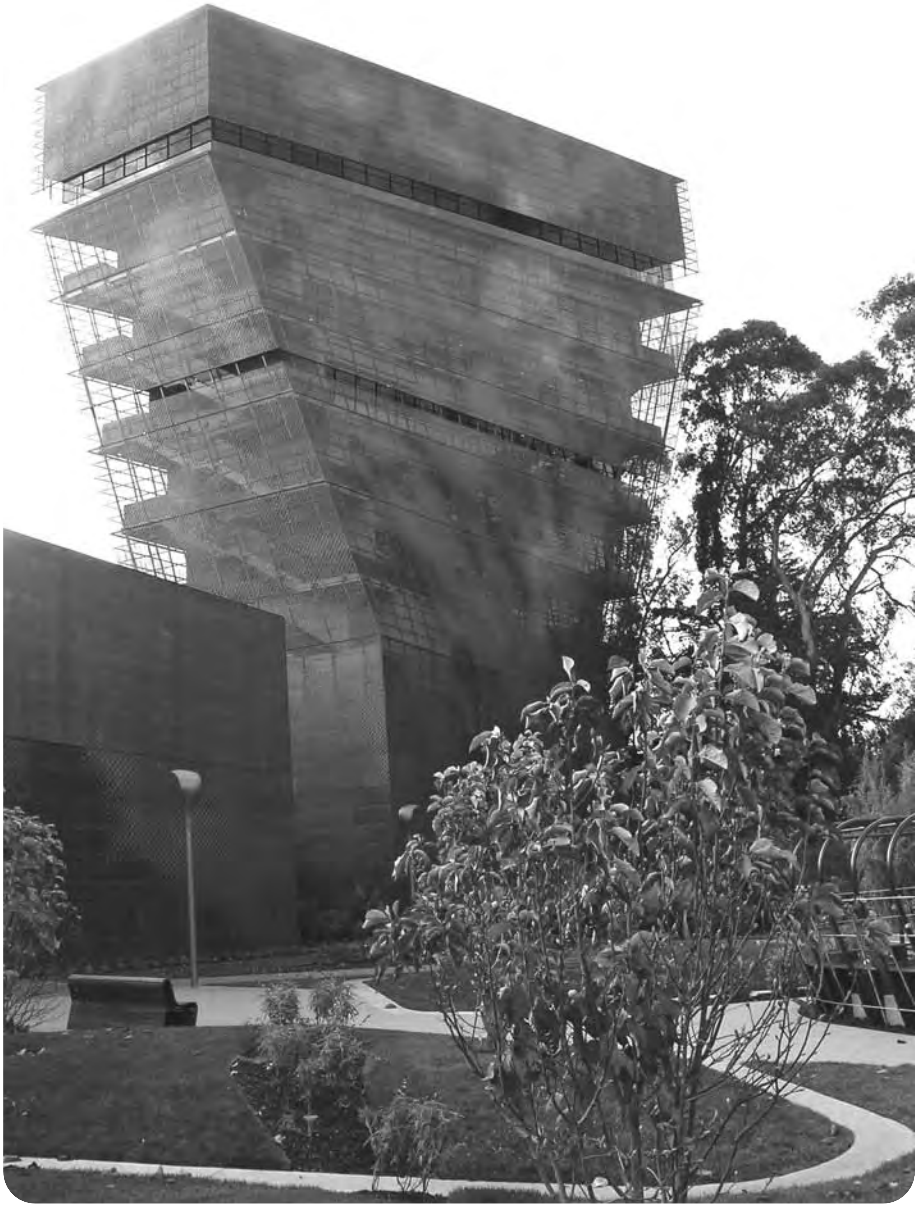

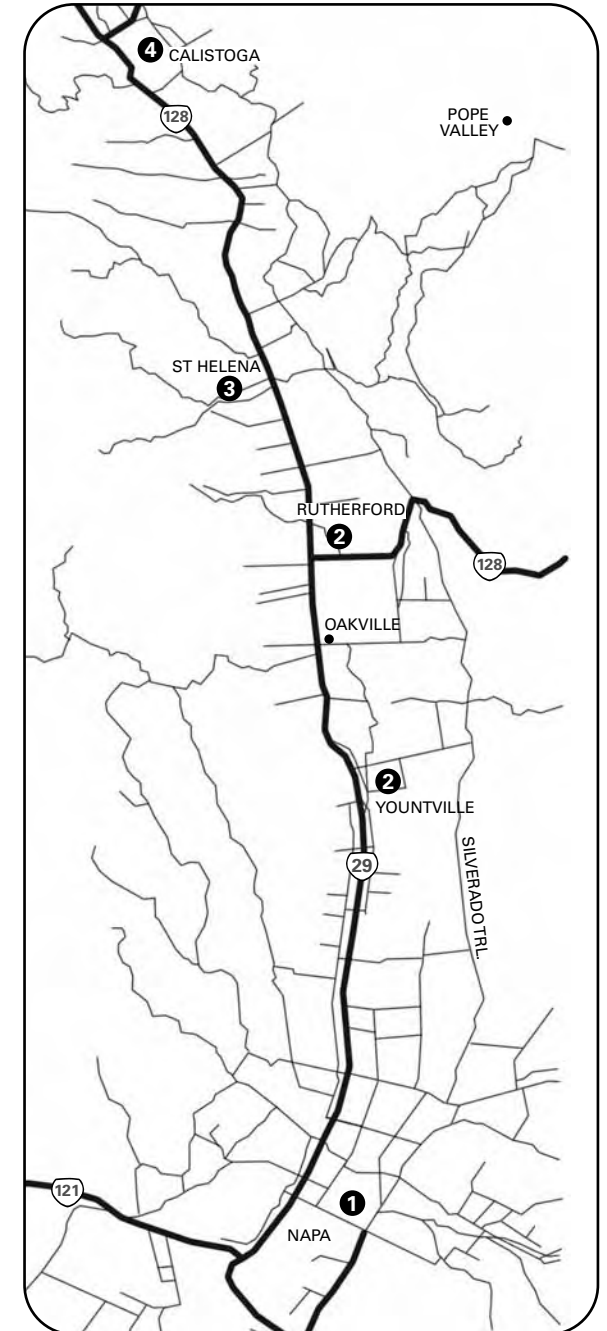

7. Paul H. Cordes House, 1912 (unmapped)

10550 Watsonville Road

Frank Delos Wolfe, architect

The house is an exceptional example of a high-style, one-and-one-half-story Craftsman bungalow, with a grand wraparound porch and river-stone porch posts. Photos of the house appeared in *Architect and Engineer* in February 1914. Some outbuildings on the property date from the nineteenth century.

8. Strand Theater, 1921

7588 Monterey Street

Reid Bros, architects

Although the theater has lost its elegant interior and front marquee, the Neoclassic building is of architectural interest on Gilroy's main street.

9. Gilroy Bowl, 1958

7554 Monterey Street

This stripped-down industrial Moderne

with an unadorned façade and angled storefront is accented by the cursive lettering of the neon sign.

10. First National Bank of Gilroy, 1912

7488–7490 Monterey Street,
at Martin Street

William Binder, architect

This two-story bank building features a pair of recessed, fluted,

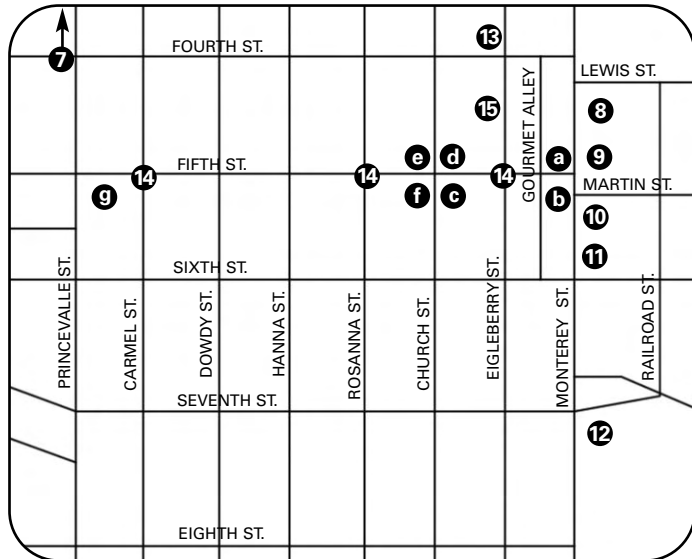
two-story columns and Neoclassical design motifs, including a triglyph cornice, a classical pediment over the front door, and transoms above the main windows.
